Each species in this checklist has been documented in Flint Pen Strand by FWC biologists, SFWMD staff, and/or CREW Trust volunteer naturalists.

Some species are year-round residents; others are only present during certain portions of the year. Some are nocturnal; others are active during the day.

There is no guarantee that you will see any of these species, but your chances are best if you are quiet, listen carefully, and move slowly.
